

Employer Toolkit Guide

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Influenza is a contagious respiratory disease that spreads easily, especially where people come into close contact, such as in workplaces. Every year, influenza causes up to 3,500 deaths and an average of 12,200 hospitalizations across Canada.

This year, to help employers keep their employees and workplaces healthy and safe, we have created an Employer Toolkit to help you in your efforts to encourage your employees to get vaccinated against influenza. In this toolkit, you will find:

Employer Toolkit

Preventing illness and employee absenteeism due to influenza is vital for the Canadian business landscape. The Employer Toolkit uses the latest behavioural science research and real-world understandings to tap into how people think and behave to increase vaccine uptake. These methods are cost-neutral, easy to implement, and scalable. Through our research, we have identified the following evidence-based approaches that can help you encourage employees to get their influenza vaccine this year:

- Provide information that addresses the benefits versus the risks of influenza vaccination and debunks the myths about the influenza vaccine. The source and type of information people have available to them affects their decision-making. By providing a reminder about influenza vaccinations, you can ensure they will be top of mind for employees.
- Use the term "influenza" instead of "flu" to convey the severity of the influenza virus and the importance of getting an influenza vaccination.
- When discussing the influenza vaccine, use "gain framing" to show how employees could benefit from the vaccine. For example, by receiving their annual influenza vaccination, employees will reduce their risk of hospitalization, the possibility of spreading influenza to those they care about, and time away from work due to illness.
- Use concrete examples and vivid imagery of those who need protecting.
- Have a staff manager share the influenza vaccine messaging, as messages sent from people we know and relate to are more effective.
- Encourage employees to make plans about getting vaccinated that include specific details on the where, when, and how.
- Provide visible and regular cues and reminders in the local environment (office, warehouse, break room) to increase uptake and follow-through for getting an influenza vaccine.
- Assign employees specific dates and times for their vaccinations, giving them the option to opt out (rather than inviting them to opt in).



Key messages and FAQs for employers

The Key Messages and FAQs document is to help facilitate dialogue between employers and employees. It offers quick messaging proven through behavioural science to help employers demonstrate why influenza vaccination is important, how the spread of influenza affects the workplace and how employers are making it easy for employees to be protected from influenza.

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


Template Email Blast from HR to Employees

Template Calendar-hold for Vaccine Appointments

A template calendar-hold for vaccine appointments will enable employers to set an appointment time for each employee. All employees will have the option to opt out of their appointment. However, removing this step for employees increases the likelihood that they will attend their vaccination.
