April 20, 2016 (OTTAWA) – During National Immunization Awareness Week (NIAW), Immunize Canada reminds Canadians that immunizations are safe, effective, and keep communities healthy by preventing the spread of disease. Community immunity helps protect individuals that are particularly vulnerable to diseases and their complications, such as infants too young to be fully immunized and the elderly who are at risk of serious illness.

- National Immunization Awareness Week (NIAW) takes place April 23 to 30, 2016.
- Immunize Canada is a national coalition with the overall aim of increasing awareness about the benefits of immunization and promoting the understanding and use of vaccines as recommended by the National Advisory Committee on Immunization (NACI).
- Community immunity occurs when most people within a community have received a vaccine; reducing the spread of disease. Community immunity protects the small number of people who cannot be immunized for medical reasons.

 - access to reliable, expert-approved, bilingual information about vaccinations for children, adults and travelers
